Our aim for disadvantaged pupils is to ensure that their progress, attainment and health is at least as good as non-disadvantaged students. We aim to reduce the current achievement gap that, for many disadvantaged pupils, still exists. We are determined, through planned focused and purposeful actions, to accelerate the progress of disadvantaged pupils, to improve their life chances. All practitioners will be expected to make every effort so that this gap is consistently reducing to enable disadvantaged children to succeed through a wealth of enriching curriculum experiences at The Orchard Nursery.

To deliver quality teaching to all EYPP children to ensure children maximise their learning and provide sufficient challenge to accelerate learning across the prime areas.	Key workers will identify their EYPP children, observe and track their progress and offer additional support where needed.	New EYFS requires a more individual approach to learning and progress. Keyworkers get to know children very well and observe children in the moment to enable children to follow their interests. This allows practitioners to move children's learning forward.	Observations are completed in focus weeks, which take place 6 times a year. Key workers will use our 'Orchard Goals' as a guide alongside teacher knowledge to assess each child's development and their readiness for school.  The key worker will share their assessments and highlight progress and any concerns.  Concerns meeting with supervisors and managers will further identify children that need extra input and support. Starting points show concerns for communication skills for EYPP children	<p>Clear programme of work. Focussing on individual child's next step in communication, depending of level of need. They are also important for health as children need to move to be active. Being physically active helps build a healthier body composition, stronger bones and muscles. It also improves the child's cardiovascular fitness. Children who have higher levels of physical activity during their childhood are likely to be more active even after they mature.
